#### 5. Approval of the FY 2023 YMPO Title VI Plan

YMPO Title VI Coordinator Charles Gutierrez will update the Board changes to the FY 2023 YMPO Title VI Plan, which includes the changes to the Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 Plan, the Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan, the Public Participation Plan, and training that has already occurred.

#### 6. YMPO Rail/Heavy Freight Alignment Study - Update

The YMPO Rail/Heavy Freight Study started in August 2021, and the Board last received a status update in July 2022. YMPO Staff will provide an update on progress that has occurred during the past month including the results of the recent YMPO Rail/Heavy Freight Agriculture Business Public Engagement held on August 11, 2022.

#### 7. FY 2022 Audit Schedule

The FY 2021 Audit was completed and presented to the Board by the Audit company, Walker and Armstrong during the February 2022 Board meeting, YMPO Staff is preparing for the FY 2022 Audit with the proposed schedule in the information summary.

#### 8. <u>Defense Community Infrastructure Pilot (DCIP) Program Grant Update.</u>

The DCIP Program is a Department of Defense effort administered by the Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDCC). Following recent Board approval, consultant firm Wilson and Company was contracted to pursue the DCIP Grant for approximately \$13.3 million for US-95 improvement northward from Rifle Range Road to Wellton-Mohawk Canal. ADOT submitted the grant proposal (Phase 1) on July 15, 2022, and YMPO Staff is patiently waiting for feedback on possibly moving forward to (Phase II) of the process on or about August 22, 2022, to submit a formal application if selected.

This item is on the agenda for information, discussion, and possible comment only, at this time and Crystal Figueroa, YMPO Executive Director, will present this item, an information summary as item 8.

#### 9. Regional Project Priority List

The Rural Transportation Advocacy Council (RTAC) Board is going through the process with the Greater Arizona MPOs/COGs to develop a list of projects submitted on behalf of RTAC based on population for consideration next year by the State Legislature. The list for the Yuma region consists of at least \$13M, 26M, and \$40M worth of projects and the YMPO Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) has compiled another list of regional projects for consideration and recommended approval by the Board.

This item is on the agenda for information, discussion, and action to approve the Regional Project Priority List of Projects. Mr. Gutierrez will present this item and information summary is included as item 9, including the packet of this year's priority projects.

#### 10. YMPO Legal Services

After fifty-five years of service to clients, YMPO attorney Wayne C. Benesch has decided to retire at the end of the calendar year. As a result, the managing partner

Trevor White, and Associate Attorney Elizabeth Punpayuk, will continue to serve the firms' clients, including YMPO, if desired. The most recent contract, with Benesch, Shadle & White, PLC., has been in place since January 1, 2021, for a two-year term ending on December 31, 2022. The YMPO Board will have the opportunity to discuss and decide whether to extend the existing contract with continued representation by this firm, or advertise for Legal Services.

This item is on the agenda for information, discussion, and possible action to authorize the Executive Director to extend the existing contract or advertise for Legal Services. Ms. Figueroa will present this item and information summary is included as item 10.

#### 11. Regional Coordination Plan (RCP) Request for Proposal Update

Each MPO is responsible for producing a Regional Coordination Plan under the Mobility Management Program. The plan must be maintained to include all 5310-funded projects at the regional level to assist local transportation providers in assessing and developing local and regional mobility management and coordination options. YMPO Staff has advertised the RFP for an update to the existing YMPO Regional Coordination Plan, but no proposals were received. The Mobility Manager will provide a status update of progress for re-advertisement of RCP.

#### 12. 2023 Arizona Rural Transportation Summit (AZRTS) Planning.

The annual conference for the AZRTS is scheduled for September 14 and 15, 2022, at the Ak-Chin Casino and Resort, in Maricopa. The summit is a signature event for Rural Arizona, in which elected and appointed local government officials, transportation professionals, legislators, and other guests engage in solutions to improve and enhance transportation in Greater Arizona. Customarily, the MPO/COG rotates hosting responsibility of the RTS, and YMPO's turn to host the conference here in Yuma falls during October 2023. YMPO staff has begun looking for a venue a year in advance and has a preferred recommendation for the Board's consideration.

#### 1. Call to Order and the Pledge of Allegiance

Chairman Martin Porchas called the meeting to order at 1:30 p.m. He called on Councilmember (and Vice-Chairman) Gary Knight to lead, and asked members to join him, in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### 2. Roll Call Attendance and Declaration of Votes

<u>Declaration of Votes:</u> All three representatives for the City of Yuma and both representatives for Yuma County were either present and/or on-line, so the votes would be cast based on the default voting decided at the beginning of the year.

#### 3. <u>Title VI Declaration and Call to the Public.</u>

Ms. Norma Chavez, YMPO Bookkeeper, read a message reminding members of the YMPO Title VI obligations. No members of the public addressed the Board.

#### 4. Consent Agenda.

- A. Approval of the June 30, 2022, Board Meeting Minutes.
- B. YMPO Income/Expenditure Report for June 2022.

A copy of the draft minutes of the Regular Board meeting from June 30, 2022, accompanied the agenda and the June 2022 financial report was also provided for review. Ms. Crystal Figueroa, YMPO Executive Director, reported that Mr. Bruce Fenske, the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) Southwest District Administrator, had requested a minor correction to the draft minutes. On page 4 of 7, reference had been made to the ADOT Metropolitan Planning Division. The name of the Division should be correctly called the Multimodal Planning Division.

MOTION: Vice-Chairman Knight moved to approve the June 30, 2022, regular meeting minutes, as amended, and to accept the YMPO Income/Expenditure Report for June 2022, as published. Councilmember Karen Watts seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

#### 5. Requested Changes to the YMPO Title VI Plan and Training.

Mr. Charles Gutierrez, YMPO Senior Planning Manager (YMPO Title VI Coordinator), updated the Board on proposed changes to the YMPO Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 Plan, the Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Plan, and the Public Participation Plan (PPP). In addition to the listed changes, Mr. Gutierrez conducted a brief training session for members of the Board on the FY 2023 YMPO Title VI Plan. There was no further action expected as part of this agenda item.

#### 6. YMPO Rail/Heavy Freight Study - Update Report.

Mr. Gutierrez updated the Board on the YMPO Rail/Heavy Freight Study. The second round of stakeholder meetings occurred in July 2022. The turn-out for the San Luis and Yuma public engagement meetings was higher than expected. Mr. Gutierrez stated that 34% of attendees chose at least one of the alternative routes for the rail, but the majority of the 65 respondents who attended the second meeting were not supportive of any of the routes under current consideration.

About half did not want any rail and half of the remainder only supported rail if it was NOT on farmland.

As for future steps, Mr. Gutierrez continued that there will be more public involvement and all of the alignments will be formally assessed. In about a month there will be a technical analysis and an economic impact analysis that focuses on direct, indirect and induced effects in local business activities. The end result will be a recommended alignment. The next step involves another public meeting focusing on, but not limited to, the farming community.

Vice-Chairman Knight stated his support for further public meetings and expressed the importance of gaining the opinions of the agricultural and military stakeholders. He also asked when the 2013 study was conducted, were there not informal agreements already been established with these stakeholders in reference to building a rail-line?

Mr. Gutierrez assured Vice-Chairman Knight that these stakeholders had been approached in a timely fashion. He was not aware of any agreements made with said stakeholders during the 2013 study.

Supervisor Lynne Pancrazi asked if the Bureau of Reclamation was also included as a stakeholder. Mr. Gutierrez confirmed that the Bureau had been one of the stakeholders formally contacted regarding the study. Supervisor Pancrazi also asked why the existing unused rail land, which runs through Fourth Avenue and downtown Yuma area could not be considered as an alternative route since the right-of-way already exists. Vice-Chairman Knight stated that route is "off the table", as the route was not possible. There would have to be a bridge constructed at Fourth Avenue and the rail in question could not support heavy rail. He stated that, on this alignment, the existing rail would never be able to connect with Union Pacific Railroad ever again.

Mr. Fenske asked if whomever needs to acquire land for the project, should the project get approved, would they have eminent domain available to them? Chairman Porchas opined that the rail authorities usually have that authority, but further suggested that it depends on whether the agency acquiring any such land was a government agency or not.

Mr. Gutierrez reminded members that the study is still in the conceptual phase. YMPO is very interested in any comments and referred all to the YMPO website to leave comments. He also stated he would compile all comments resulting from the latest stakeholder meeting and provide those comments to the consultants who are conducting the study.

Based on the greater than normal interest received to date, Ms. Figueroa suggested that YMPO would consider holding an additional public meeting to

gather further input into the alignments, especially from, but not limited to, the farming community. Further information regarding such an additional meeting would be forthcoming and all members would be notified. There was no further action expected as part of this agenda item.

#### 7. Amendment #3 to the FY 2022-23 Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)

Ms. Figueroa presented this item and showed a copy of the staff memorandum which was included in the agenda packet. There were 21 items in the memorandum that accompanied the packet which detailed the changes to funding sources and work to be performed. Most of the changes addressed the closeout of the budget for fiscal year 2022, the deferral of funds and the work associated to FY 2023. The memorandum also included two ongoing studies, the Regional Coordination Plan, and the San Luis Downtown Redevelopment Study, which included YMPO funds for the Origin-Destination (O-D) Study component and ADOT funds being passed-through YMPO for the Downtown Circulation and Parking Studies components. Finally, there are two major YMPO Studies in the memorandum, the Roads of Regional Significance Study and the Complete Streets Concept Study. Ms. Figueroa then briefly showed the updated funding tables and summarized that the budget had slightly decreased to \$1,647,594 in combined federal and local funds.

Ms. Figueroa continued that several more grant opportunities were expected to become available during the next few months as part of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL, aka the IIJA) and, based on the recent Notices of Funding Opportunities (NOFOs) for those Grants released, generally the timelines for applying for these Grants do not allow for sufficient time for requesting funds for each Grant process.

As a result, she had previously suggested establishing a single Grant Application for Transportation Equity (GATE) line item in the UPWP. This item includes a total amount of \$60,000 in local funds, and would give authority to the Executive Director to allocate up to \$15,000 for separate consultant contracts to pursue grants as they become available, and was now being presented, as part of this UPWP Amendment, for approval.

MOTION: Vice-Chairman Knight moved to approve Amendment #3 to the FY 2022-2023 YMPO UPWP, as shown in the staff report and authorize the Executive Director to enter into consultant contracts, with companies to apply for as-yet undefined transportation grants made available through the BIL. Ms. Watts seconded the motion, and it was unanimously carried. As a follow-up, Ms. Figueroa confirmed that she would report back to the Board regarding any uses of these funds for consultant contracts.

#### 8. <u>Defense Community Infrastructure Pilot (DCIP) Program Grant Update.</u>

Mr. Paul Ward, YMPO Principal Engineer, presented this item and explained that the DCIP Program is a Department of Defense effort administered by the Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDCC) and that this was the third year of the program. Having been informed of the opportunity, at very short notice, Mr. Gutierrez set up a series of meetings, with various stakeholders, including staff from the ADOT SW District and the Executive Grants Team, the US Army-Yuma Proving Grounds (YPG), YMPO, Greater Yuma Economic Development Corporation (GYEDC), and an Arizona State Transportation Board representative, to solidify a grant application proposal.

Following Board approval of the funding at a special Board meeting earlier in June 2022, a small consultant team from Wilson and Company was contracted to pursue the DCIP Grant for approximately \$13.3 million for US-95 improvements from Rifle Range Road to the Wellton-Mohawk Canal bridge. Mr. Ward summarized the steps in the process and reported that the result has been the successful submittal of the Grant to the Defense Department, by the ADOT Coordination staff. Mr. Gutierrez reported that the application had been accepted and that we expect to hear some feedback from the Defense Department during the middle of August. No Board action is anticipated on this item, at this stage.

#### 9. Regional List of Projects.

Ms. Figueroa presented this item and reported that last year, the Rural Transportation Advocacy Council (RTAC) went through a lengthy process with the Greater Arizona Metropolitan Planning Organizations and the rural Councils of Governments (MPOs/COGs), compiling a regional list of projects that were submitted on behalf of RTAC for possible State funding through the State budget process and NOT for regular funding by ADOT. As a result of last year's effort, the Yuma region received \$3.5 million in State general funds (instead of the expected \$6.5 million) for US-95 widening improvements in the State budget approved mid-June 2022.

As the State budget appears to be generating a similar surplus again this year, the RTAC Board authorized an additional effort for next year's budget cycle. The YMPO Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) has already started compiling another list of regional projects for consideration and recommended approval by the YMPO Board at next month's meeting. The goal is to have the lists of priority projects to promote and engage our Legislators at the upcoming Rural Transportation Summit, to be held in the City of Maricopa between September 14-15, 2022.

Mr. Gutierrez showed the list of projects from last year and reported that the TAC has until August 4, 2022, to submit additional projects for inclusion on the list that will be presented to the YMPO Board and then to the RTAC Board. Ms. Figueroa added that this year's intent was to target three different total amounts, for \$100, \$200 and \$300 million. The expectation is that, if funds are allocated to the RTAC

list, the YMPO region should receive approximately \$13, \$26, or \$40 million in funding, based on population, and depending on the amount authorized by the State Legislature.

10. YMPO FY 2022-2026 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendment #3. Mr. Gutierrez presented this item and outlined the changes being requested to the TIP. He pointed out some corrections to project numbers, federal funding changes, tweaks to project descriptions and some new projects being submitted by Yuma, Yuma County, YMPO and a series of transit project changes being requested by YCIPTA.

Vice-Chairman Knight moved to approve Amendment #3 to the YMPO FY 2022-2026 TIP, Deputy Mayor McClendon seconded, and the motion was unanimously approved.

#### 11. Regional Coordination Plan (RCP) Request for Proposal (RFP).

Mr. J. R. Aguilar, Jr., the YMPO Mobility Manager, presented this item, reporting that the RFP for the RCP was advertised on June 22, 2022, with e-mail invitations being sent to over 35 different consultant companies.

The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Section 5310 Program focuses on Enhanced Mobility of Seniors (65 years and over) and Individuals with Disabilities, primarily in the Urban Areas, through ADOT Transit Staff. The plan must be maintained to include all 5310-funded projects at the regional level to assist local transportation providers in assessing and developing local and regional mobility management and coordination options, and the most recent YMPO RCP that was approved occurred in 2017.

Proposals were due to YMPO by 3:00 p.m. on July 20, 2022, but no proposals were submitted by that date. YMPO staff have contacted the consultant companies to see whether there are any reasons why their companies did not respond and/or to gain any feedback on whether they are interested in submitting, if YMPO decides to re-advertise.

YMPO staff have reviewed the RFP in detail, will make any changes that are needed to the RFP and the associated timeline, and will correct several errors in the contact names on the original distribution list of consulting companies. We expect to re-advertise the RFP within 30 days and expect to make a recommendation to the Board, regarding a preferred consultant company, by the October meeting.

Ms. Figueroa reminded members that this has happened before, with the Short-Range Transit Plan. In that case, YMPO re-advertised and receive four bids by the extended deadline and resulted in a successful Plan.

#### 12. <u>Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP) Applications for Federal Fiscal</u> Years (FFYs) 2025 and 2026 Update

Mr. Gutierrez presented this item and reported that all applications for HSIP funded projects for FFYs 2025 and 2026 had been delivered to the ADOT Traffic Safety Section, for their review and comment, with ADOT questions expected by tomorrow, July 29, 2022. The deadline for answering those questions, by YMPO member agencies, has been extended and this response time is expected to be mid-September.

Mr. Gutierrez briefly outlined the projects submitted for consideration by ADOT and reported that they totaled almost \$28 million, with benefit/cost (b/c) ratios between 6.3 and 18.3. During the last HSIP cycle for FFYs 2023 and 3034, which occurred almost three years ago, the lowest funded b/c ratio was 6.5 and the YMPO region received almost \$10.2 million in federal funds.

Based on the additional safety funds in the BIL, Mr. Gutierrez indicated that there had been discussions regarding a possible second round of safety projects. However, he reported that the YMPO consultant team is ready to react to whatever comments or questions ADOT may have and the TAC members from each agency had been alerted to be ready to respond, as needed.

Mr. Ward reported that, very recently, some of the projects that had been selected during the previous cycle were shown in the Yuma Sun as going in front of the Board of Supervisors for approval of the intergovernmental agreements between Yuma County and ADOT to actually construct the projects concerned.

# 13. The Arizona Rural Transportation Summit (AZRTS) Board attendance follow-up. Ms. Dale presented this item, reminding members that the annual RTS conference for the AZRTS is currently scheduled for September 14 and 15, 2022, at the Ak-Chin Casino and Resort, in Maricopa. Customarily, members of the Executive Board are invited to attend this conference and YMPO will normally pay for registration, lodging and travel to the conference. She gently reminded members to please let her know who wanted to attend as the early-bird registration date was approaching on July 31, 2022. Chairman Porchas, Vice-Chairman Knight (who was being paid for by ADOT), and Secretary/Treasurer McCollough confirmed their attendance for the conference.

Ms. Dale indicated that YMPO intended to provide members a chance to influence Yuma region legislators by inviting them to dinner, probably at the Chop, Block and Grill restaurant on the first night, after the initial conference meet and greet was over. Currently, members of YMPO staff are expecting to attend the conference.

The Chairman called on Kevin Adam, the RTAC Legislative Liaison, to provide some input by confirming that after the early-bird deadline, prices would increase. He also cautioned that the conference allocation of rooms had temporarily been

exceeded, but that the organizing team staff was arranging an increase in the number of rooms.

Mr. Fenske reported that the CalTrans/ADOT bridge project on I-8 over the Colorado river is breaking ground in October. During the project, I-8 will have lane closures approximately four times. There was some bridge rehabilitation work on Fourth Street and Giss Parkway replacing the bridge rail with concrete and which will result in a two-month closure, to occur during August and September, as this project must be finished before the CalTrans project can start.

Mr. Kevin Adam, RTAC, stated the legislature adjourned their session. They were able to approve the budget, directing approximately a billion dollars in one-time funding to infrastructure. They discussed the rural priority list which was directed towards transportation. Next year, there will be a push towards getting funding for local projects in the state budget, but this had been covered in another agenda item.

Ms. Figueroa stated she would be interviewing candidates for the IT Manager position at YMPO and hopes to present the new IT Manager at the next Executive Board meeting.

YMPO Rail/Heavy Freight Alignment Study - Update

**DATE**: August 18, 2022

**SUBJECT:** YMPO Rail/Heavy Freight Alignment Study

#### SUMMARY:

The Rail/Heavy Freight Alignment Study (Rail Study) process has started with a kickoff meeting back in September 2021, YMPO Technical Advisory Committee meeting. Charles Gutierrez is the YMPO Project Manager and will provide a summary of the intended study.

So, why are we doing the efforts for a Rail/Heavy Freight Corridor. We are re-evaluating the previous recommendation of the 2013 Rail Study. Identify approximately 500' north/south corridor between the US & Mexico border and identifying the Union Pacific (UPRR) Sunset Line connection. Things of consideration include forecasted freight flows, impacts to existing or planned developments and the environment, and finally, how is the economic development of opportunities along the prospective alignment. During the study potential funding sources will be explored.

There are 7 Tasks of the Study

Task 1 - Scope of Work - Completed

Task 2 - Work Plan - Completed

Task 3 - Public and Stakeholder Involvement Plan - Underway for section - Ongoing

Task 4 Current and Future Conditions - evaluating

Task 5 Alternative Analysis - awaiting TAC Recommendations

Task 6 Economic Analysis - currently underway at this time

**Task 7 Final Report** 

As Kimley-Horn states there will be 3 major phases of work:

Phase 1: Understanding - What do we need to know

Phase 2: Analysis - What are the best options

Phase 3: Recommendations: How should we move forward

The Rail/Heavy Freight Team, Kimley-Horn and Associates (KHA), Sub-consultants Wilson and Co., Suma, Matrix, EDP, and Nicklaus Engineering will evaluate and will work with the YMPO Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) to make recommendations for the YMPO Executive Board to approve a final result.

At recent public Engagement activities July 13 & 14, the public was invited to view the story boards of the project and make comments on the Original Proposed alignments. We had approximately 70 visitors and a myriad of comments that up to today the comments are still coming in from the website and emails. The was a request to go back to the agri-business sector of our region. YMPO accommodated the request and on August 11, 2022, at the Yuma Civic Center, West Room, the public engagement activity for the agri-business folks were catered to with the YMPO and KHA team.

Currently, the KHA team is working on the Alternative Analysis and the Economic Analysis. A Stakeholder meeting was held with the Economic people of the region. The cities of Yuma and San Luis, Yuma County, GYPA and GYEDC as partners. GYEDC will be reached out to at a later time.



## 2. Conceptual Alignment Alternatives

#### **Conceptual Alternatives**

The following Conceptual Alternatives, shown in **Figure 2**, are the preliminary alternatives identified to meet the goals and objectives of the YMPO Rail/Heavy Freight Alignment study.





Working Paper 2. Alternatives Analysis

The process of identifying conceptual alternatives included the consideration of:

- Future land use maps from local municipalities and Yuma County
- Identified opportunities and constraints from the first round of stakeholder interviews and existing conditions research
- Existing or anticipated right-of-way availability

The Conceptual Alternatives were grouped into four categories geographically: South, South-Central, North-Central, and North.

#### South Alternatives

The South Alternatives are located in the portion of the study area that stretches from the U.S./Mexico border to the east-west section of SR 195. The four Southern alignment alternatives have connections to SR 195 right-of-way and provide access to Mexico just east of the San Luis II Border Port of Entry and through a site proposed for the Sonora Crossing Transmission Line Project.

- S-1 connects from the border just east of the San Luis II POE to SR 195 following the Avenue D alignment.
- S-2 connects from the border just east of the San Luis II POE to SR 195 following a future County 25<sup>th</sup>
  Street and Avenue B connection.
- S-3 connects from the Mexican border to SR 195 following the proposed alignment of the Sonora Crossing Transmission Line Project.
- S-4 offers connections between for the other South Alternatives via the SR 195 right-of-way

#### South-Central Alternatives

The five South-Central alignment alternatives provide options for connecting through the four-mile span between SR 195 and County 19<sup>th</sup> Street.

- SC-1 connects from SR 195 to County 19<sup>th</sup> Street via the Avenue D alignment, then turns eastward along the County 19<sup>th</sup> Street alignment to Avenue B.
- SC-2 connects from SR 195 to County 19th Street via the Avenue B alignment.
- SC-3 connects from SR 195 to County 19<sup>th</sup> Street just west of SR 195 following the proposed Sonora Crossing alignment.
- SC-4 follows the SR 195 right-of-way from the Sonora Crossing right-of-way to County 19th Street.
- SC-5 offers connections between the other South-Central Alternatives along the County 19<sup>th</sup> Street alignment.

#### North-Central Alternatives

The five North-Central alignment alternatives provide options for connecting through the five-mile span from County 19<sup>th</sup> Street to County 14<sup>th</sup> Street.

- NC-1 connects County 19th Street to County 14th Street via the B Main Lateral Canal right-of-way.
- NC-2 connects County 19<sup>th</sup> Street to County 14<sup>th</sup> Street via the A8-9 Lateral Canal right of way.
- NC-3 connects from the intersection of SR 195 and County 19<sup>th</sup> Street to County 14<sup>th</sup> Street west of Avenue 6E following the proposed Sonora Crossing alignment.
- NC-4 follows the SR 195 right-of-way from County 19th Street to County 14th Street.
- NC-5 offers connections between the other North-Central alternatives via the County 14<sup>th</sup> Street alignment.

#### North Alternatives

The five Northern Alignment alternatives connect from County 14th Street to the UPRR Sunset Line.

- N-1 travels from the intersection of County 14<sup>th</sup> Street and Avenue 3E, follows a north-south alignment just east of Avenue 3E until it intersects with an existing rail spur from the UPRR line.
- N-2 connects from the intersection of County 14<sup>th</sup> Street and Avenue 3E and follows the B Canal right-of-way to an existing rail spur from the UPRR line.
- N-3 follows right-of-way obtained by APS for a new transmission line now under construction that connects from County 14<sup>th</sup> Street west of Avenue 6E and follows the Gila Gravity Main Canal to the UPRR line.
- N-4 follows the SR 195/Araby Road alignment from County 14th Street to the UPRR line.
- N-5 connects from the intersection of SR 195 and County 14<sup>th</sup> Street to the east following the County 14<sup>th</sup> Street alignment to Avenue 15E where it turns northward and crosses I-8 to connect with an existing rail spur from the UPRR line near Rifle Range Road.

#### **Conceptual Alternatives Screening**

The screening process for the Conceptual alternatives is made up of three primary sources: TAC and stakeholder input, public input, and a high-level technical analysis to identify fatal flaws.

#### TAC and Stakeholder Input

The Project Team engaged regional stakeholders for the second time during this planning process to obtain specific input on the Conceptual Alternative alignments. Interview groups and dates are shown in **Table 1**. Summaries of each of the stakeholder meetings is provided in **Appendix A**.

- Heavy rail connectivity to a new deep-water port along the west coast of Mexico had been considered in the past, however this linkage has not been resurrected by the current administration in Mexico

- Land south of the airport and agricultural fields near that area appear to be more feasible

- There are concerns for types of materials being transported via train near the bombing range and how incidents involving hazmat or derailment will be exasperated due to the proximity of the bombing range.
- o MCAS not only owns the right of way near the conceptual alternatives but the air rights as well.
- Orphaned parcels near conceptual alternatives NC4 and NC3 have ordinances buried within them and would require extensive precaution measures and studies to allow any construction.
- Would prefer alignments most west running of the bombing range.

#### City of Yuma

 The N5 alternative negatively impacts state lands and the residents near that alignment are very vocal when in opposition of proposals.

- Gowan Milling and Yuma County Cotton Gin are concerned about conceptual alternative corridors disturbing operations.
- Utilizing 4E Street or 4 ½ E could have less impact on developed areas
- There is expected pushback from agriculture landowners for alternative corridors that utilize farmland.
- MCAS has concerns for impacts and potential development

#### Mexican Stakeholders

- Interest from Mexican stakeholders has been very positive, development near the American border garners interest in future freight possibilities as well as more southern connections in Mexico.
- The Agency for the Promotion of Economic Development known as OPRODE in Mexico is a very interested stakeholder for this study however, turnover in the administration has made input meetings difficult to schedule and maintain. Once the administration personnel are solidified in their positions, more detailed input on the project will be feasible.

#### Public Input

Two in-person open house meetings were held, one in Yuma and one in San Luis, to allow the public to provide input on the conceptual alternatives. The San Luis public meeting was held on July 13<sup>th</sup> at San Luis City Hall and the Yuma Open House was located at the Yuma County Public Work Facility on July 14<sup>th</sup>.

In addition to the in-person open houses, a public survey was available virtually through the YMPO website and in-person at the open houses. The survey was available in both English and Spanish. The survey was available from July 6<sup>th</sup> to July 24<sup>th</sup>, 2022. A total of 262 surveys were received, 70 of which were paper surveys collected at the public open house and the remainder were submitted virtually through SurveyMonkey. The public survey results are summarized below.


How supportive are you of a future freight rail corridor in the Yuma Region?






Which Southern Alternative do you feel would be best for a future rail corridor?




Which South-Central Alternative do you feel would be best for a future rail corridor?


The assessment of Conceptual Alternatives was evaluated using the criteria categories of Land Use, Roadway System, Environmental and Constructability. The evaluation rated alternatives based on impact to the applicable category criteria with a score of poor (1), fair (2), or good (3). The scoring breakdown for each alternative is shown in **Table 2** and the results are shown graphically in **Figure 3**. Using these results, Candidate Alternatives were selected which went through a more vigorous technical analysis.

- N-1/N-2 may also have a potential for adverse impact(s) to MCAS Yuma

- Support the conceptual alignment routes furthest to the east (i.e., S-3, SC-4, NC-3, NC-4, and N-5)
  - Keeping the railway along the eastern alignment avoids the agricultural areas where produce is grown. The options avoid food safety/rail crossing issues.
- Kimley Horn had questions specific to special precautions or required distance along the rail lines, as well as visual guide delineating farmland from the Arizona Farm Board. However, the Board members did not delve into these topics because of their preference for the easternmost alignments.
- The Board members noted that alignments on the west end of the study area created serious concerns for growers in the area.
- The board expressed that alignment S-3 is preferred to S-1 or S-2, as the location of the S-3 alignment helps reduce traffic congestions by keeping the truck and rail ports separate.



**DATE**: August 18, 2022

SUBJECT: Defense Community Infrastructure Pilot (DCIP) Program Grant Status Report

#### SUMMARY:

The DCIP Program is a Department of Defense effort administered by the Office of Local Defense Community Cooperation (OLDCC). YMPO staff were alerted to this program in late May 2022, and immediately reviewed the Grant details. YMPO worked with ADOT staff from the Southwest District, the Multimodal Planning Division, the Executive Grant Team, and the Yuma Proving Grounds (YPG) Commander, Colonel Ben "Patrick" McFall, U.S. Army, and a team of his staff. The Board formally approved the funding during a Special Executive Board meeting on June 15, 2022, and YMPO promptly hired a small consultant team from Wilson and Associates.

Consequently, the project application was successfully completed, submitted, and accepted by the reviewing agency. An evaluation panel has recommended funding to the Under Secretary of Defense (Acquisition and Sustainment). ADOT staff are currently working with a DoD Project Manager to formally apply for the funds. All grant agreements must be issued and countersigned prior to September 23, 2022, so the appropriated funds can be obligated no later than September 30, 2022.

Overall, widening on US-95 is being addressed under a 2007 Design Concept Report, between Avenue 9E and Aberdeen Road, a total of almost 16 miles. Currently, the segment from Avenue 9E to Rifle Range Road (aka Blaisdell Road) just north of the Fortuna Wash bridge, a distance of 2.8 miles is under construction and is expected to be open to traffic in the next few months. The segment that will receive these funds is between Rifle Range Road to just north of the Wellton-Mohawk Canal, a distance of approximately 3 miles.

#### **PUBLIC INPUT:**

No members of the public have commented on this request, to date.

#### **TECHNICAL & POLICY IMPLICATIONS:**

TECHNICAL: ADOT has fully funded the project with a combination Federal Highway Administration and State funds, so the project is guaranteed to proceed, once the bids are received and a contract is signed. However, the intent is to utilize the DoD funds on the current roadway segment and to transfer some of the State funds to the next segment of the roadway, in due course.

POLICY: The region utilized local funds to apply for federal Grants.

#### **Regional Project Priority List**

**SUBJECT:** Regional Project Priority List

#### **SUMMARY:**

The Rural Transportation Advocacy Committee has gone through a lengthy process last year with the Arizona Greater MPO/COGs participating in an exercise of compiling project in our region, by municipality, by ranking and again compiling for a regional list of projects to be submitted on behalf of the RTAC and Arizona Congressman to be considered for Arizona funding.

The Yuma region will receive 3.5 million dollars through the Legislative process that the RTAC successfully made with the Arizona Congress. These efforts will be used for the U.S. 95. That being said another RTAC push for the regional project lists has been requested to the MPO/COGs of Arizona.

The YMPO TAC has a recommended project list for the 2022 RTS that was created using the same criteria and updating last year's list. The overall RTAC intention is to target project amounts of \$100M, \$200M, and 300M. The expectation for the region if funds are allocated by the legislative process, the region should receive approximately \$13, \$26, or \$30 million dollars of funding, based on population, and depending on the amount authorized by the State Legislature.

A video will be made to incorporate the member projects and during the Arizona Rural Transportation Summit (AZ RTS) the video will be presented during the conference and the congressional session.

A total of 84 projects will be submitted. A cost for all projects is \$400,500,000. The Prioritized number one (1) project for each member is as follows.

SUBJECT: Regional Coordination Plan (RCP) Status Report

#### **SUMMARY:**

The YMPO RCP is a plan that identifies the transportation needs of individuals with disabilities, senior adults, and people with low incomes. It provides strategies for meeting those local needs and prioritizes transportation services for funding and implementation. This effort is funded by the Federal Transit Administration's (FTA) 5310 Program through the Arizona Department of Transportation's (ADOT) Transit Section. A full update to the RCP normally occurs every four (4) years with annual updates to the data being provided by YMPO staff. The RCP aims to maximize the program's collective coverage by minimizing the duplication of services.

The Request for Proposal (RFP) for the RCP was distributed to the public on June 22, 2022. Approximately 4 weeks after distribution all RFPs were to be submitted to YMPO by 3:00 PM on July 20th, 2022. Unfortunately, YMPO did not receive a submittal to meet the deadline.

YMPO has called over 30 Consultants to try and determine why no submission for the RCP were made to YMPO. ADOT reviewed the RFP, made comments and suggestions for improvement. The new PROPOSED timeline is as follows:

- Release date August 24, 2022
- RFP submittal September 21, 2022
- RFP Distributed to TAC September 22, 2022
- TAC recommends consultant October 13, 2022
- Notice to proceed possible approval by Board
  - o October 27, 2022
- Tac recommends approval April 13, 2022
- RCP final report dur April 27, 2022

**PUBLIC INPUT:** No members of the public have commented on this to date.

#### **TECHNICAL & POLICY IMPLICATIONS:**

TECHNICAL: The RCP is part of a Mobility Management Program that varies, based on the needs of each region.

POLICY: FTA and ADOT require the development of a RCP as part of receiving funds for the 5310 Program.
