# 1. Call to Order and Declaration of Votes.

In the absence of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman, Dave Wostenberg, City of Yuma, called the meeting to order at 9:10 A.M. The City of Yuma declared votes

as Dave Wostenberg (two votes) and Jennifer Albers (three votes). Yuma County alternates Alan Quintero and Santos Guerrero declared one vote each.

# 2. <u>Title VI of the Civil Rights ACT of 1964.</u>

The YMPO Title VI Nondiscrimination Notice to the Public was read by YMPO Mobility Manager, Jesus Aguilar, Jr.

# 3. Call to the Public

There were no announcements from the public or TAC members.

#### 4. Approval of Minutes

The March 9, 2023, TAC meeting minutes had been included with the agenda. Mr. Wostenberg moved to approve the minutes and Mr. Quintero seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

# 5. Regional Coordination Plan Update.

Mr. Aguilar introduced this item. He reported that, since kicking-off the YMPO Regional Coordination Plan (RCP) on November 1, 2022, LSC Transportation Consultants (LSC) have presented Tech Memos #1, #2 and #3, to the Regional Mobility Committee (RMC), TAC, and the Executive Board (EB) for review and comment. All necessary comments and recommendations have been taken into consideration to present the final draft of the 2023 YMPO RCP. Mr. Aguilar introduced Justine Marmesh and Claire Hutchinson, from LSC, to present the Final Plan for possible action to recommend to the Executive Board.

Ms. Hutchinson began by explaining that the RCP effort is a study that will ultimately enhance regional mobility for senior adults, disabled persons, and low-income persons. The plan is developed through a process that includes representatives of the public, private, non-profit transportation, human services providers, and participation by members of the public. The demographic summary shows the following:

- One out of every five Yuma County residents is a senior adult over the age of 65;
- There are 25,773 disabled persons in Yuma County;
- It is estimated that 18 percent of the Yuma County population lives below the federal poverty level.

Ms. Hutchinson displayed Yuma County's Transit Needs Index, which is a metric that LSC developed that compares the relative transit needs of the different communities within the YMPO region, by calculating the actual concentration of each of the demographic groups within the specific community. The demographic groups shown in the metric are:

- Senior Adults (65+);
- Persons with a Disability;
- Persons Below Poverty Level;
- Unemployed;
- Zero-Vehicle Households.

Based on the results, Somerton ranked the highest for the greatest concentration with disabilities, persons below the poverty level, unemployed, and zero-vehicle households. Yuma, San Luis, and Fortuna Foothills also indicated a moderate need after Somerton. The demographic analysis and the analysis of the existing transit providers within the YMPO region show that the identified needs are:

- More providers that will serve residents living in rural areas of Yuma County;
- Staffing and vehicle shortages causing lack of services;
- Driver and staff training around special clients, such as those with disabilities with Alzheimer's;
- Filling transportation gap with loss of Nazcare and SAAVI services;
- Transportation services for non-medical related trips.

Ms. Marmesh said that based on the input from the public, TAC, EB, and RMC, they have developed the following goals by recommended priority.

- 1. Maintain Existing Transportation Services;
- 2. Increase Public Awareness of Available Transportation Resources;
- 3. Increase Cooperation and Coordination Amount Transportation Providers;
- 4. Enhance or Expand Transportation Services.

A brochure of YMPO's FTA 5310 Transit Program Providers was shown to the TAC, where it describes the 5310 program and lists the types of services providers in the region offer along with their contact information.

Jennifer Albers, City of Yuma, asked whether a Spanish version of the brochure will be available. Ms. Marmesh replied that a Spanish version of the brochure will be developed.

Ms. Albers requested consistency in the data being represented and the demographic tables shown and the LSC staff agreed to ensure that this occurred.

Mr. Aguilar reminded members that the item is for possible action to recommend to the Executive Board acceptance of the 2023 YMPO RCP, with comments from Ms. Albers being considered.

Saul Albor, City of Somerton, moved to recommend acceptance of the 2023 YMPO RCP with comments from Ms. Albers being considered. Ms. Albers seconded the motion, which was unanimously approved.

#### 6. Call for Projects.

Although YMPO TAC members submitted projects for consideration of, and possible inclusion in, the FY 2024-28 YMPO Transportation Improvement Program (TIP), Paul Ward, YMPO Principal Engineer, advised the TAC that not much information is currently available to members. However, a copy of the draft FY 2024-28 YMPO TIP will be made available for TAC review by the next meeting. The TIP is planned to be presented to the TAC for possible recommendation for approval by the YMPO Board in the month of June. Mr. Ward stated he will contact member agencies individually to confirm the projects that have been submitted for addition and/or changing. Ultimately, the final copy of the TIP will be presented for recommendation for approval from the TAC to the Executive Board.

Mr. Wostenberg said that the City of Yuma will be submitting a scoping document for bus pullouts on behalf of the Yuma County Intergovernmental Public Transportation Authority (YCIPTA) for possible funding.

# 7. <u>Carbon Reduction Program</u>

Mr. Ward presented this item by reporting that the Carbon Reduction Program (CRP, known as "Carp") is a new program that was included in the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) with the result that approximately \$300,000 will be made available to the YMPO region for allocating to CRP eligible projects per year for years 2022 through 2026. Because the CRP is very new, YMPO will have 3 years of CRP apportionments available as no projects have been programmed with these funds to date.

Many members are aware regarding how the funds available can be used, but the current Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) contains funding to develop a set of guidelines for how to develop a YMPO Federally Funded Program. The guidelines will contain further guidance to members regarding the types and amounts of funds available to members and what projects match them best.

A copy of the CRP Eligible Projects List was provided to the TAC. CRP funds may be obligated for projects that support the reduction of transportation (carbon dioxide) emissions.

Mr. Ward stated that currently, YMPO is in the project selection process and will determine whether projects that will be submitted will meet the guidelines. Mr. Ward noted that the due date for draft CRP Strategy & TIP from MPOs/TMAs is August 18, 2023.

Mr. Hoffman informed members that planning activities are also eligible under the CRP, and this is especially important during the early years of such a new program.

#### 8. FY 2024-2026 YMPO Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)

Mr. Ward announced that the draft version of the UPWP for the next two fiscal years is available, on the YMPO website, for review and comment. The UPWP contains YMPO's budget and is primarily funded with Federal funds, and some from local and in-kind match, that are used to match the federal funds. The UPWP mainly contains a series of major requirements that YMPO needs to produce. The Long-Range Transportation Plan is one of a major requirements along with the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP). In addition, YMPO is planning to develop a Traffic Count Map that will include all the in-house traffic count data collected. Some other studies and plans that are included in the UPWP are:

- A Regional Safety Plan;
- A Complete Streets Study;
- A Roads of Regional Significance Study; and
- A Set of Federally Funded Program Guidelines;

#### 9. YMPO and ADOT

Mr. Hoffman provided a quick update on the ongoing Arizona Long Range Plan. Currently, the ADOT leadership is going through the investment categories of preservation, expansion, and modernization, and the levels of funding in each category to be approved and presented to the State Transportation Board. The plan is expected to be completed in August and will be available for review. A draft report for the Sonora Border Master Plan is expected be available soon.

Crystal Figueroa, YMPO, advised the TAC that a Senior Planner position will soon be advertised on the Yuma County website and other various platforms. Additionally, the Arizona Rural Transportation Summit is being hosted by YMPO this year on October 18-19, 2023. Our members are encouraged to participate and will be updated on the upcoming event.

# FY 2024-28 YMPO Transportation Improvement Program - Initial Review

SUBJECT: FY 2024-28 YMPO Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) - Initial

**Review and Comments** 

#### SUMMARY:

YMPO utilizes a two-year cycle for developing the region's TIP and has chosen a five-year time frame. Title 23, Code of Federal Regulations, Subsection 450.326 contains guidance on the development and content of the metropolitan TIP. Based on the previous FY 2022-26 YMPO TIP, the seven amendments that were carried out, and the recent changes made to projects in the YMPO federally funded program, an updated list of projects has been developed for the next five years. The written portion of the TIP document has not changed much, except for the revised numbers and types of federal funds anticipated.

The following tentative schedule outlines the steps that are anticipated to be needed to obtain a recommendation by the YMPO TAC followed by an eventual approval of the final TIP by the YMPO Executive Board by their meeting on June 29, 2023. Following this, the TIP will be sent to the Governor for her approval and eventual inclusion into the State TIP which is then reviewed by the various Federal authorities.
